# Triduum(TREE-doo-oom)

- The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum
- The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season
- Stretches over three days-from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday
- One liturgy, celebrated over three days, it unfolds the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery
- Paschal Mystery=Christ's suffering, death and resurrection
- Leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil
- The liturgical services that take place during the Triduum:
  - Mass of the Lord's Supper
  - Good Friday of the Lord's Passion
  - Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord



- How do you feel about what Jesus has done for you?


# Links for your family to pray the **Stations of the Cross**Usually done on Good Friday. Here are four options.

## A note about Easter Season



- The season of Easter, a 50-day period, begins at sunset on the eve of Easter and ends on Pentecost, the day we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church. Pentecost will be celebrated on May 23, 2021.
- The word "Easter" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world.
- The entire Easter season celebrates the Resurrection of Christ. It is a period of joy and hope, as Jesus Christ has saved us from ourselves.
