The Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time

Our first reading today from the book of Wisdom begins, “God did not make death, nor does he rejoice in the destruction of the living.” God always wants good for us, and God always has the best intentions for us. As humans, we sometimes mess up God’s intention with our poor choices, but God still always hopes the best for us. Why doesn’t God make everything good all the time? Well, that is because God gave us the gift of free will to make our own decisions. God is not a puppet master predetermining our decisions.
